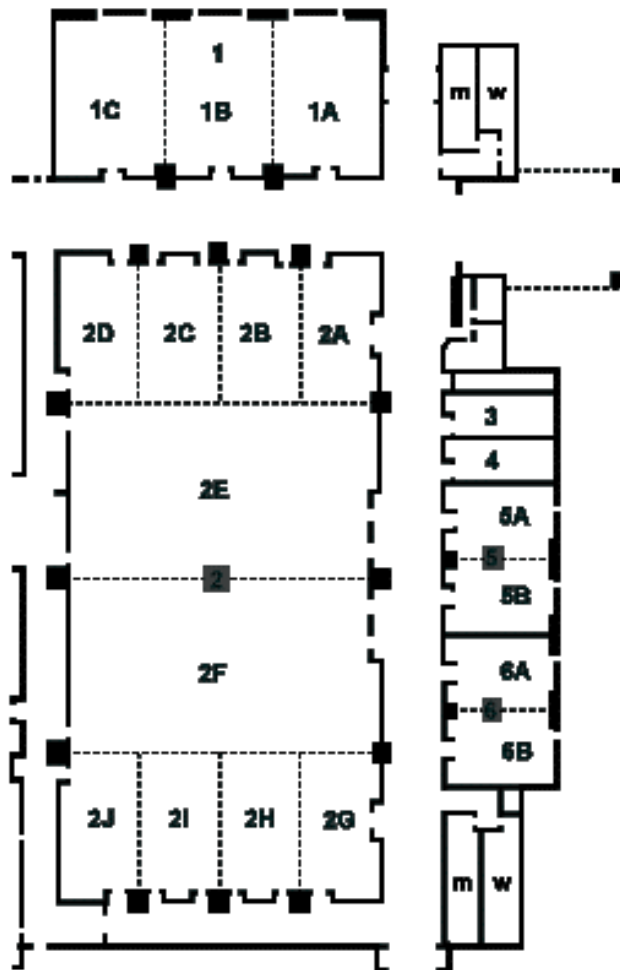

TENNESSEE YMCA MODEL UNITED NATIONS RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

I: General Rules

- A. **AGENDA** – The agenda of the General Assembly is drawn up by the Center for Civic Engagement (CCE) and shall be regarded as adopted at the beginning of the session. There shall be no revisions or additions to the agenda without approval of the CCE staff.
- B. **OFFICERS:** the President of the General Assembly and the Vice-Presidents shall be the presiding officers of the General Assembly and its Plenary session. Other conference officers or delegates may be called on to preside over committee sessions as directed by the CCE staff.
- C. **RESPONSIBILITIES OF OFFICERS:**
 - a. Declare the opening and closing of each plenary session.
 - b. Moderate the discussion in plenary session.
 - c. Uphold these rules of procedure.
 - d. Uphold the expectations set forth in the Officer Code of Conduct.
- D. **LANGUAGES** – All sessions shall be conducted in English. Any participant wishing to address the session in another language may do so, provided he/she brings his/her own interpreter.
- E. **QUORUM:** Two-thirds (67%) of the assigned delegates shall constitute a quorum of the General Assemblies, Plenary session, and committees. A quorum must be present for any session to conduct the business on its agenda.
- F. **DECORUM:** All delegates are expected to maintain decorum, i.e. appropriate behavior, during all sessions. Delegates behaving inappropriately are subject to disciplinary action by presiding officers and the CCE staff. The Delegate Code of Conduct defines further expectations for appropriate delegate behavior.

II. General Assembly (GA) sessions:

- A. **Docket:** the docket for GA sessions shall be determined by the CCE staff based on rankings of resolutions by committees. The docket for each GA session is only amended in extraordinary circumstances with the permission of the CCE staff and presiding officers (the chairs). Delegates who wish to amend the docket (i.e. reschedule the debate on a resolution) should bring their concerns to the presiding officers before moving to amend the docket.

B. Resolutions:

- a. The content of resolutions should conform to the expectations laid out by the CCE staff in the Delegate Manual.
- b. Resolutions may **only** be amended during GA committee sessions.

C. Presentations:

- a. The patrons of each resolution are responsible for presenting their resolution to the GA according to the rules of procedure and decorum and the format for debate. Only GA delegates can present resolutions to the GA.
- b. Patrons should not use props of any kind during their presentations or the debate on their resolutions.
- c. Patrons may invoke **Patron's Rights** only when a speaker in debate has offered factually incorrect information about the text of their resolution. Patron's Rights allows the patrons ten seconds of uninterrupted speaking time to correct the factual error. Patrons must wait until the speaker has concluded their remarks before exercising these rights.

D. Debate:

- a. GA Delegates may speak when recognized by the chair. Delegates' remarks must be relevant to the items on the agenda at any given time.
- b. Once recognized, delegates must identify themselves to the session with their name and the country they represent.
- c. Delegates recognized as speakers in debate have the right to do **two** of the following things with their speaker's time. Speakers must inform the chair of their intentions before continuing to:
 - i. Address the floor/session
 - ii. Ask the patrons of the resolution a series of questions
 - iii. Yield the remainder of their time to another delegate in the session
 - iv. Make a motion. Motions should be made after one of the previous actions.
- d. Speaker's time: unless otherwise indicated by the chair, each speaker shall have two minutes to address the floor. Speakers who have been yielded time by another delegate may not yield any further time. Unused speakers' time shall be yielded to the chair.

E. Intent Speeches: delegates and members of the Secretariat may submit intent speeches during debate on resolutions during GA and the Plenary sessions.

- a. Intent speeches are limited to 2 minutes and are delivered between the end of technical questions on the resolution and the beginning of debate on the resolution.
- b. Intent speeches may only address the floor/session; intent speakers must identify themselves and request permission to address the floor.
- c. Intent speakers may not yield their time to another delegate, ask the patrons questions, or make a motion.
- d. Intent speeches do not count as rounds of debate.
- e. Delegates may only deliver one intent speech during the conference.

F. Voting:

- a. When voting on GA resolutions, each delegation has one vote, including the delegation presenting the resolution. GA resolutions pass with a simple majority, i.e. more 'ayes' than 'nays.'
- b. Delegations may abstain on resolutions only when the abstention follows current policy positions of their government.
- c. When voting on all other motions, each delegate has one vote. The majority required is found on the Table of Motions in the resolution book and the Delegate Manual.
- d. During voting procedure, delegates may not leave or enter the GA session until the results of the voting have been determined by the chair.

G. Amendments:

- a. GA Delegates may propose, debate, and vote on amendments only in GA committees. Amendments require a simple majority to pass.
- b. Patrons of resolutions may submit simple amendments to their own resolution before beginning their presentation. Such amendments should not change the nature or intent of the resolution, but make simple corrections. Once they have begun their presentation, patrons may not submit amendments to their own resolution.
- c. Any amendments must be written on the appropriate form, be legible, and be germane.
- d. Amendments must be recognized by the chair before the final round of debate, i.e. before the chair has recognized the last "pro" speaker for the debate.
- e. The patrons of the resolution must declare any amendment "friendly" (if they agree with the proposed amendment) or "unfriendly" (if they disagree).
- f. Friendly amendments may be passed without debate through voice acclamation.
- g. Unfriendly amendments are debated in the appropriate format. The amendment's sponsor acts as the patron of the amendment, and the patrons of the resolution have the right to be the first con speaker in the debate.

BRIEF DEFINITIONS:

Adjourn: this action ends the session and is only in order with the permission of the CCE staff.

Appeal: a legislative body may appeal a decision of its presiding officer if 2/3 of its members think that the chair has made an incorrect ruling on a procedural matter.

Reconsider: motions to reconsider any motion are only in order with the permission of the CCE staff.

Point of Personal Privilege: this point should be used to address delegates' comfort or ability to participate in the conference session, i.e. climate control issues, PA volume, etc.

Suspension of the Rules: a successful motion to suspend the rules affects only the main motion at hand. Suspended rules are 'back' once voting/ranking procedures are complete.

Point of Information: these points are questions directed to the chair for factual information relevant to the debate at hand. The chair may redirect the question to a delegate who is likely to have an answer.

Point of Order: these points are questions directed to the chair asking for clarification of rules of procedure.

SCRIPT FOR CCE MUN DEBATE

BY TUCKER COWDEN, MHMS

*Script is written with the assumption of more than one patron for the resolution/bill. If there is only one presenting patron, change statements to the singular (i.e. "Does the Patron" instead of "Do the Patrons").

OVERVIEW

Model UN (MUN) debate should be seen in the context of the actual United Nations General Assembly, where delegates speak directly on behalf of the governments of the nations they represent and the items debated are called **resolutions**. Because of this setting, MUN delegates should know their nation's stance on important world issues and approach them as that country's government would (even if the delegates do not agree with that approach). This applies especially to the resolution that you are presenting. It should address not only an issue that the delegates think is important, but one that the country's government thinks is important and would actually present to the UN. Also, although the event is called "Model UN," speakers referring to the body should not say that "the Model UN" should do such-and-such. You are to be completely in character, acting as if Model UN were the actual United Nations (so refer to the conference as "the UN" or "the United Nations").

ASKING TECHNICAL QUESTIONS

(after being recognized by the chair)

Speaker: [States Name, States Country, States **One** Question (must be one that merits a response of yes, no, a number, a definition, or a short, expository rather than persuasive answer) (the question is directed to the presenting delegates)]

CON/PRO DEBATE

(after being recognized)

*Delegates may take one or two of the three actions listed below (ask questions, speak to the floor, yield time to another delegate), but may not only yield time to another delegate (you can only ask questions or only speak, but cannot only yield time).

Speaker: (States Name, States Country) and...

- To Ask A Series of Questions

Speaker: Do the Patrons yield to a possible series of questions? (**Not:** “a series of possible questions,” or “a question.”)

Chair: They do so yield

Speaker: (To Patrons) (Asks Questions and receives answers for up to two minutes, depending on the committee/GA/plenary’s time structure).

*It is important to note that questions asked as a Con speech should seek to criticize, or at least show skepticism for, the given resolution. Those asked as a Pro speech should do the opposite, emphasizing the positive aspects of the resolution.

- To Address the Assembly

Speaker: May I address the floor?

Chair: That is your right.

Speaker: (Speaks to fellow delegates, not the patrons, for the allotted amount of time either in favor of (pro speech) or against (con speech) the resolution).

*You should never use the words “Con” or “Pro” in your speech unless referring to “a previous con speaker,” etc. Con and Pro are not nouns or verbs that can be used to show your support or dislike of a resolution (so **do not** say “I con this resolution”).

- To Yield Remaining time after one of the above to a fellow delegate:

Speaker: May I yield the remainder of my time to a fellow delegate?

Chair: That is your right. Please specify a delegate.

Speaker: [Names the delegate to be yielded to (refer to him/her by country)] (Takes first action)

*Delegates being yielded to should have the same opinion (pro or con) on the resolution as the speakers that yield to them.

MOTIONS

(must be made before the last con speech)

Speaker: (Shouts) Motion!

Chair: Rise and state your motion.

Speaker: (States Name, States Country, States Motion—see table of motions in delegate manual)

Chair: [Takes it from there (decides if the motion is in order or not, asks for a second to the motion, and conducts a vote, usually by voice acclamation)]

A Resolution to Construct Additional Roadways throughout Albania

- 1 Recognizing the fact that Albanians are not provided with enough beneficial roads.
- 2
- 3 Aware that this can cause high unemployment and low income rates.
- 4
- 5 Keeping in mind that if none of these problems are fixed then the population will
- 6 continue to suffer due to economic problems.
- 7
- 8 Concerned that not taking action could cause catastrophic problems in the near future.
- 9
- 10 We call upon the Model UN to provide \$9.9 million in loans and the 3.3 million in
- 11 donations to build new roads, including piezoelectric roads, as well as repair some
- 12 existing roads.
- 13
- 14 Reminding that we will continue to replace and pay back the loans over fifteen years.
- 15
- 16 Encouraged that building roads will help increase economic activity and decrease the
- 17 unemployment rate.
- 18
- 19 Emphasizing that piezoelectric roads will also help provide additional electricity to areas
- 20 of Albania currently suffering from regular power outages.
- 21
- 22 Resolving to solve both of these problems simultaneously, so Albania can eventually
- 23 become a stronger and more developed nation, which will contribute to the overall
- 24 world economy.

A Resolution to Improve Trans-Icelandic Infrastructure

- 1 Taking note that there is no proper highway connecting our nation through the center
- 2 of the island, further increasing travel times for civilians and for cargo long,
- 3
- 4 Fulfilling the need for average citizens to be able to travel from our capital, Reykjavik,
- 5 to our other large population centers on the other side of the island,
- 6
- 7 Concerned by the fact that Iceland's perimeter faces an over tourism problem, because
- 8 tourists cannot efficiently access the center of the island,
- 9
- 10 Further noting that the Republic of Iceland has a two-lane highway connecting the
- 11 perimeter of the island. This highway (Highway 1) has a travel time of 8 days,
- 12
- 13 Alarmed by the fact that the existing highway, Federal Highway 26, is hideously
- 14 underdeveloped and has hazardous offroad conditions,
- 15
- 16 The General Assembly hereby:
- 17
- 18 Declares that a new highway cutting through the center of Iceland will have a civilian
- 19 travel time of two and a half hours, and that travel for cars and cargo trucks will much
- 20 faster, more efficient, and safer;
- 21
- 22 Seeking a wish to also build an electric railway of 160 miles running next to Highway 26
- 23 from Reykjavik to Akureyri. This would be a cargo-only train with 20 boxcars to
- 24 transport resources across the island;
- 25
- 26 Further proclaims that this newly paved highway will increase center-island tourism and
- 27 help develop the heart of the island;
- 28
- 29 Draws attention to the fact that building a railroad that runs on renewable energy will
- 30 further help the environment;
- 31
- 32 Expecting that this new railroad will cut cargo travel times in half and make cargo
- 33 transport more affordable from this growing nation;
- 34
- 35 Further reminds that connecting these two largely populated cities will increase trade
- 36 between northern countries using the Northwest Passage;
- 37

38 Resolves that the Republic of Iceland would like to borrow a total of \$271,246,500 from
 39 the Official Development Office (ODA) and the Financing for Development Office
 40 (FDO) to help pay for the railroad as well as highway costs, for the greater good of
 41 Iceland, and its neighbors;
 42
 43 Considers that this plan should go into effect by December, 2021 and that all money,
 44 and 5% interest, will be paid back to the UN in the time span of 10 years.

1 Noting with concern that half of Rwanda's population is illiterate,
 2
 3 Keeping in mind that the UN has already done things to provide assistance to help
 4 including writing the Chapter III Education and Illiteracy,
 5
 6 Fully aware about Chapter III Education and Illiteracy and the Functional Literacy for
 7 Youth and adults in Rwanda: National Policy and Strategy by the UN,
 8
 9 Acknowledging work the Center for Media Literacy has done,
 10
 11 Further recalling recent statements by the U.N., about how Palestine recorded the
 12 lowest adult illiteracy rate, and Bahrain has the lowest youth illiteracy rate, and the GPI
 13 rates for adult and youth illiteracy in Yemen are the lowest in the region at 0.6 and 0.8,
 14
 15 Noting that as of 2002 27% of school-age children are not in school in Rwanda,
 16
 17 The General Assembly hereby:
 18
 19 Accepts that many European countries in the past 20 years have introduced media
 20 education into all types of schooling and education systems, we should extend this to
 21 other continents that have low literacy;
 22
 23 Reaffirms that the UN should build more schools in low literate countries;
 24
 25 Requests that countries should make laws requiring children 6-16 to go to school;
 26
 27 Draws attention that teachers should be certified by the country's government;
 28
 29 Declares that any race, gender, religion, class, or nationality should be able to go to
 30 school;
 31
 32 Endorses that the UN should build more libraries, mobile and normal;
 33
 34 Further invites countries with more wealth to donate school supplies to Rwanda and
 35 other illiterate third world countries.

- 8 Be more aware of 90 percent of children in residential institutions in Armenia have at
- 9 least one living parent.
- 10
- 11 Inclusive education involves children with disabilities studying in their community
- 12 schools with reasonable support for academic and other achievement.

- 14 Further recalling, all children have the right to grow up in a family, and government and
- 15 donor resources should support families and children, not large institutions.

- 22 Providing adequate care for these children is becoming increasingly difficult as they

- 25 The number of nursery schools is decreasing because poverty is forcing close to 80 per
- 26 cent of preschool-aged children to stay at home

A Resolution to Provide an Education to Children in Haiti

- 1 To the General Assembly:
- 2
- 3 Noting with concern that Hurricane Matthew struck Haiti over two years ago and Haiti
- 4 has still not recovered from this tragic incident,
- 5
- 6 Further recalling that one-half of all Haitians age 15 and older are illiterate and that the
- 7 quality of education in Haiti is incredibly poor,
- 8
- 9 Cognizant of the fact that trucks leave over 100,000 tons of waste each month across
- 10 200 acres of land severely endangering the citizens of Haiti,
- 11
- 12 Bearing in mind that the citizens of Haiti have scarcely any knowledge so they are not
- 13 able to construct buildings to protect themselves from the many natural disasters,
- 14
- 15 The Delegation of Haiti does hereby:
- 16
- 17 Declares the intention of Haiti to resolve the destruction that Hurricane Matthew has
- 18 mercilessly produced across Haiti;
- 19
- 20 Requests 7.7 million US dollars from the United Nations to be able to resolve the issue
- 21 of having many uneducated kids, building schools, teaching salaries, books, hurricane
- 22 proof sustainable technology, and overall necessities to go into the school. Without this,
- 23 children would not have an education and a safe place to go if another natural disaster
- 24 arises;
- 25
- 26 Proclaims to employ citizens of Haiti to aid the effort of decontaminating Haiti and the
- 27 reconstructing of it;
- 28
- 29 Resolves to construct hurricane-proof schools in the recently cleansed area to avoid
- 30 destruction from catastrophic natural disasters;
- 31
- 32 Understands that constructing schools will allow the illiteracy rate to lower permitting
- 33 many children to get an improved education;
- 34
- 35 Further recommends that teachers get a salary of \$55,000 per year (the average salary
- 36 in the United States);
- 37

38 Reminds that this trial basis will have a duration of one year in which the educators
39 volunteering to come will teach future instructors the art of education;
40
41 Urges the United Nations to reflect upon the horrendous situation of Haiti and the need
42 for education.

A Resolution to Install Water Filters for Households in Malta

To the General Assembly:

Because of the recent increase of premature deaths in Malta which has grown 7% in the last 10 years to over 300 premature deaths due to the presence of nitrate pollution in household water systems,

Deeply concerned that Malta has the worst pollution rates in the Mediterranean, which has increased because of the recent spike in manufacturing and construction,

Noting that nitrate pollution is the presence of harmful nitrogen-infused fertilizers in the drinking water that the people of Malta drink, which then causes various symptoms and diseases such as blue baby syndrome, which is the most common reason for premature deaths in our country,

Noting that the blue baby syndrome causes young infants' hearts to not properly pump blood throughout the body, which in return disallows the baby to gain weight, receive proper amounts of oxygen, and have regular-tinted skin,

Drawing the attention that Malta has a population of 400,000 people and 57% of the water in Malta is contaminated or improperly filtered,

We the Delegation of Malta hereby declare:

A request of 8.175 million dollars, which is 0.15% of the United Nations total budget, will be used to install home water filters to each household in Malta, and to pay for those who install them,

Noting that there are roughly 145,600 homes in Malta, and that there is a common household of roughly three, each filter will be priced around 200 dollars for each home and the installer will be paid 25 dollars per installment,

Hoping to decrease the number of premature deaths and blue baby syndrome cases significantly by the next five years,

Noting that our goal is to by the next five years have home water filters for more homes in the Mediterranean region, which include Spain, France, Monaco, Italy, etc., which in return will decrease the percentage of unclean water in this area of the world.

Sri Lanka Resolution

1 To the General Assembly:

2
3 Observing that 16 people have died and hundreds of houses have been destroyed since
4 2017 from the trash mountain, Meethotamulla, which fell in Colombo, the capital of Sri
5 Lanka.

6
7 Realizing that the trash is blocking roads and paths to school and work causing students
8 and workers to be delayed or die,

9
10 Bearing in mind that there have been many government projects such as, the Colombo
11 Environmental Impact which tried to clean up Colombo and Water Supply and
12 Sanitation Improvement Project for Sri Lanka that tried to ignore the problems and help
13 the citizens. They have accomplished nothing.

14
15 Noting with deep concern that 23 million tons of garbage have been spilled,

16
17 Regretting that the air pollution of the trash has affected almost 40% of the population
18 from conditions such as asthma, pneumonia, and Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary
19 Disease (COPD),

20
21 Disturbed by the fact that the pollutants in the air are affecting rainfall, resulting in
22 unsanitary water and mutations in the aquatic ecosystems.

23
24 The Delegation of Sri Lanka does hereby:

25
26 Calls upon the UN to donate 1 million US dollars for 48 water wheels and incinerators.
27 This will also be used for repairing the machines and training and paying personnel to
28 work the machine. They will be in all cities with a population of 10 thousand people or
29 more. 300,000 dollars will be for the water wheels. Trash will cascade over the water
30 wheel generating energy which can be used for those who don't have power for their
31 lives. The smoke coming out of the incinerators will not harm the environment, for it
32 will pass through triple charcoal filters before it reaches the atmosphere. 200,000
33 dollars will be for 48 incinerators. The water coming off the water wheel will fall into an
34 incinerator. It will generate ash which can be used as fertilizer. The rest will be used for
35 maintenance and personnel.

36

37 Designates biodegradable trash to be sorted separately so it will be composted.
38 Prisoners can be assigned this community service to shorten their sentence. It will be
39 used to create cash crops such as mustard and soy beans. The crops will be used to pay
40 back the UN and to support its economy.

41
42 Emphasizes that prisoners will sort through the trash and find biodegradable objects.
43 Those objects will be recycled into an assortment of objects that contribute to daily life.

- 14 suitcases, secret compartments in ships, and by simply bribing the employees.
- 15
- 16 Noting the fact that the people who sell these illegal drugs are incredibly rich.
- 17 They can afford to do many things that security cannot keep up with
- 18
- 19 Expressing concern at the fact that there is a multitude of airports and docks that do
- 20 not have enough money to have a suitable security system.
- 21
- 22 The Delegation of Argentina does hereby:
- 23
- 24 Request funding to strengthen the security systems in the country so as to ensure that
- 25 any drugs passing through will be found and disposed of. We are requesting
- 26 \$65,000,000USD in funding. The money will be spent on security equipment such as
- 27 surveillance cameras, buying updated equipment, detectors, sniffer dogs, etc..
- 28
- 29 Taking into account that as soon as the systems are deemed satisfactory, the money
- 30 can be returned to the UN.
- 31
- 32 Keeping in mind that Argentina is not a poor country and should be able to pay back
- 33 the money. We will give back \$178082.20USD per day which will allow us to pay back
- 34 the money in one year. By adding security to docks it benefits everyone as there will
- 35 less access to illicit drugs.

- 22 upkeep.

- 25 less displaced children living homeless.

A Resolution To Prevent Abuse in Detention Camps in Oceania

- 1 Noting with concern that 442 of the 13,049 citizens of Nauru are asylum seekers and
- 2 refugees being sent by Australia.
- 3
- 4 Alarmed by the fact that abuse, especially pertaining to children, is a major issue in the
- 5 camps due to inexperienced Australian camp guards.
- 6
- 7 Keeping in mind that there were 19 cases of violence and sexual assault, including 8
- 8 against children, in a period of 18 months, by the guards of this camp.
- 9
- 10 Emphasizing that 16 of the 37 known deaths in detention centers have been suicides,
- 11 due to the poor living conditions in these camps.
- 12
- 13 Fully aware that the UN, Amnesty International, and Human Right Watch have already
- 14 ruled that Australia's indefinite detention of refugees is illegal, and that Australia is also
- 15 sending these refugees to the neighboring country of Papua New Guinea.
- 16

- 5 worst in the world, and much higher than the global average.
- 6
- 7 Deeply Concerned that only 45% of children attend primary school, most of the other
- 8 55% spend time collecting water or doing other things for their families. Meaning that
- 9 this resolution will expedite the United Nations Sustainable Development Agenda goal 4
- 10 to establish quality education, which includes all boys and girls attending free primary
- 11 school by 2030. This is simply not possible when there is a shortage of clean water.
- 12
- 13 Aware that 93% of water in Ethiopia is used for agriculture, much higher than the
- 14 global average of 70% as well as the fact that Ethiopia's economy is dependent of
- 15 agriculture, it represents up to 50% of their GDP. This importance is further stated by
- 16 the UN's Dublin statement on Water and Sustainable Development, which confirms that
- 17 water has economic value for all uses.
- 18
- 19 Frustrated at the fact that only 11% of Ethiopia's population has basic sanitation
- 20 services, as well as the fact that 67% of young child deaths happen before their first
- 21 birthday. Although 1.9 billion people have gained access to proper sanitation since
- 22 1990, Ethiopia still struggles in this field.
- 23
- 24 Aware that this resolution will expedite the United Nations goal 6 of its Sustainable
- 25 Development Agenda to ensure access to water and sanitation to all.
- 26
- 27 We the delegation of Ethiopia do hereby
- 28
- 29 Call upon the United Nations to assist in the installation of 2000 reverse osmosis
- 30 purifiers, as well as 4000 water wells to provide water for agricultural irrigation as well
- 31 as drinking and food preparation. The water will help to solve the clean water problem
- 32 in our country, as well as decrease the unacceptable infant mortality rate.
- 33
- 34 Further request \$80,000,000(80 Million) US dollars, or 2,200,000,000(2.2 Billion)
- 35 Ethiopian Birr for the purchase of the required equipment to construct these wells and
- 36 purification systems, as well as replace the filters when required.
- 37

38 Notes that because the Ethiopian government will not benefit from the installation of
39 these water systems in any way therefore there is no plan to repay the United Nations
40 of the money. However, the resolution will assist in the UN's sustainable development
41 goals.
42
43 Further Noting that because the country exports 2.9 billion U.S. dollars in agricultural
44 products including coffee, vegetables, and seeds, drought in Ethiopia is a significant

A Resolution to Decrease Air Pollution Caused by Forest Fires

1 Alarmed by increases in air pollution in Finland during winter and summer months due
2 to forest fires,
3
4 Deeply concerned that this problem could greatly increase the already 1600 premature
5 deaths yearly due to pollution,
6
7 Having considered Finland's current efforts to reduce air pollution, they fail to recognize
8 the large amount of carbon dioxide emitted from forest fires in the winter and summer
9 seasons,
10
11 Mindful of the need to increase the amount of trees that have a minimal chemical bond
12 to the soil or are fire resistant, such as the Downy Birch, in areas with high pollution
13 due to forest fires,
14
15 Having considered this extreme amount of forest fires in Finland and other areas such
16 as the United States, Canada, and the Western Cape of South Africa,
17
18 Mindful of the fact that air pollution decreases the productivity of workers, therefore
19 disrupting the overall status of the economy,
20
21 Considering that in areas like Finland most of the fire resistant trees such as the downy
22 and silver birch are mostly grown in captivity because they are used mostly for pulp,
23 plywood and furniture; birch trees only take up about ten percent of Finland's forests
24 compared to sixty seven percent pine, twenty two percent spruce, and one percent
25 broad leaf,
26
27 Having examined some major diseases caused by air pollution are of the following, forty
28 percent Ischaemic heart disease, forty percent stroke, eleven percent chronic
29 obstructive pulmonary disease, six percent lung cancer, and three percent acute lower
30 respiratory infections in children,
31
32 Recommends that people strongly consider the impact of air pollution and what it could
33 mean globally for humans and other creatures alike,
34
35 The General Assembly hereby:
36

37 Has resolved that one important way to prevent forest fires is by conducting controlled
38 burns, and in place of the easily burning underbrush, plant a silver or downy birch or
39 other fire resistant trees;

40
41 Requests the United Nations and governments who have abundances of fire resistant
42 trees to contribute trees and devote time to assist in planting them in areas with high
43 amounts of air pollution due to large forest fires;

44
45 Urges governments to increase controlled fires in large forest areas to make room for
46 more of the fire resistant trees;

47
48 Further reminds that the purpose of planting more Birch trees is important because
49 birch trees have a smaller chemical bond to the soil than most trees in Finland, because
50 they do not burn as quickly and are less likely to start forest fires;

51
52 Expresses its hope that these changes can be made in order to reduce air pollution
53 globally.

- 6 over-fishing is destroying the marine life so dear to the over ten European countries

- 10 Unfortunately, many nearly 200 million year old species are on the brink of total
- 11 annihilation due to overt violations of our fishing regulations.

- 17 An investment of 590,000 United States Dollars is required to institute a broader force

- 21 Such as the Killer Shrimp originating from the Caspian Sea region along with the
- 22 Chinese Mitten Crab, which can transmit a deadly pathogen to Europe's only crayfish
- 23 species.

- 25 Additionally, fishing of the invasive, rapidly breeding Asian Clam will be an alternative
- 26 to fishing native species. These are plentiful, as they can produce over two thousand
- 27 juveniles per day and over ten thousand in a lifetime.

- 29 Noting that these funds will aid in the purchase of patrol watercraft for use on the
- 30 Danube. These watercraft are built specifically for the purpose of safety and to prevent
- 31 damage to local marine life.

A Resolution to Decrease Drug Smuggling and Violence in Mexico Due To The Mexican Drug War

- 3 Concerned about the Mexican Drug War, including kidnappings of tourists, drug cartels
- 4 fighting over territory, and an increase in homicides to the highest level to date
- 5 according to government statistics;
- 6
- 7 Noting with concern cartels are kidnapping to distract from high profile "busts";
- 8
- 9 Emphasis on homicides. Homicides have increased 16% in the first half of 2018, there
- 10 have been a total of 15,973. The number is the highest since comparable records
- 11 began being kept in 1997;
- 12
- 13 According to the Committee to Protect Journalists, a US nonprofit, last year six
- 14 journalists were killed in Mexico. That was the highest number since at least 1992.
- 15 Since that year, more than 40 journalists have been killed in Mexico;
- 16
- 17 Pointing out drug cartels including: Los Zetas, Sinaloa, Jalisco, and New Generation.
- 18 The Mexican government has been fighting a war with these various drug cartels since
- 19 December 2006. Various drug cartels are fighting over different territories in Mexico;
- 20
- 21 Acknowledging 8,500 trucks from Zetas' headquarters in northeastern Mexico cross into
- 22 Texas on a daily basis transporting cocaine into US illegal markets;
- 23
- 24 Alarmed by police officers accepting bribes of more than \$1 billion from Mexican
- 25 cartels;
- 26
- 27 Keeping in mind primary school children know more about the history of drug trade
- 28 than the history of Mexico. Many children respect drug traffickers. They say that they
- 29 would "want to be like them." They would "like the power, the money, the luxury cars
- 30 and all the rest";
- 31
- 32 Aware that approximately 90% of US bound cocaine comes through the Mexico, Central
- 33 American corridor and then enters through maritime, air and land routes;
- 34

35 Taking note that The World Health Organization survey shows Americans report the
36 highest level of cocaine use worldwide which provides the demand for this illegal
37 market;
38
39 The delegation of Mexico do hereby declare:
40
41 Encourages kidnapper jail time to be 45 years and that criminals convicted of drug
42 related homicides be sentenced to life without the possibility of parole;
43
44 Increase jail time sentences for those convicted of producing, selling, transporting, or
45 having possession of drugs. For producing drugs, jail time would be 45 years. For
46 transporting, jail time would be 30 to 35 years. For selling drugs, jail time would be 40
47 years. For having possession of drugs, jail time would be 20 to 25 years. For being a
48 leader of a cartel, jail time would be life;
49
50 Requests United Nations security forces to aid in enforcing security by patrolling key
51 territories where suspected cartels have been set up;
52
53 Recommends that the US and Mexico should place more security on the border between
54 their respective countries and create a harsher penalty for anyone who is caught
55 smuggling cocaine, heroin, and other illegal drugs;
56
57 Reminds the UN that the United States of America shows ads on television, social
58 media, and music platforms discouraging use of marijuana, cocaine, and other
59 dangerous drugs. Although the US has taken such actions, some states have lifted laws
60 prohibiting use of recreational drugs potentially fueling the influx of marijuana;
61
62 Further recommends a public awareness campaign be established to teach children "the
63 life of a criminal," and discourage thoughts of joining a drug cartel; such as adding an
64 extra class in school teaching the children the dangers of being a member of a cartel;
65
66 Calls upon the UNODC (United Nations Office of Drugs and Crime) to increase law
67 enforcement operation work by strengthening the prosecuting and investigating
68 capacities of Mexico's complex drug trafficking and organized crime problems.

 27 toward the total elimination of toxic foam pollution;

5 Disheartened that some countries have been closing their doors to refugees,

6 Aware that this increases the number of refugees seeking asylum in Germany, Spain,
7 Sweden, and other countries in addition to Greece,

8 Alarmed by our own lack of preparedness for those refugees,

9 Recognizing that while housing needs are being taken care of, many refugees don't
10 have enough money to live,

11 Contemplating ways to help them make their own living,

12 Noting that the Declaration of Human Rights recognizes the equality of all members of
13 the human family,

14 Believing all refugees should have a fair chance at work,

15 Approving training centers to employ refugees and thus assisting the economy,
16 decreasing the 20.8% unemployment rate, and providing a plan for recognized asylum
17 seekers.

18 The General Assembly Hereby:

19 Has resolved that the refugees entering our country will start work as soon as possible
20 after training;

21 Emphasizes that the training centers would help refugees leave overcrowded refugee
22 camps and get their own homes;

36 Confirms that the three cities Athens, Thessaloniki, and Larisa in addition to the seven
37 islands Kos, Lesbos, Chios, Samos, Leros, Crete, and Rhodes would each
38 house a center, the main branch being in the capital city of Athens (10 centers);

39 Affirms that the unemployment would decline with refugees going through the program
40 and becoming employed, many of them being trained to do manual labor jobs such as
41 construction;

42 Proclaims that the overall well-being of Greece and other countries that utilize this
43 program would improve;

44 Requests that the training center employ experienced teachers, and that the training
45 center have different departments for each field of work;

46 Accepts that the training center would be funded by donors, government financing, and
47 potentially a small fee from refugees;

48 Recognizes that people with prior experience in a field should be placed in that field;

49 Concedes that the UN would have to pay \$2,500,000 to start and construct the centers,
50 but acknowledges that this amount would be repaid as soon as possible;

51 Hopes that the United Nations will support us by funding the program and centers;

52 Reminds the UN of the struggles of refugees and their wish to live better, independent
53 lives.

- 3 Alarmed by the rapid depletion of the water resources of South Africa and its
- 4 surrounding countries

- 6 Having considered, We propose a motion to request guidance from the UN in improving
- 7 the current situations specifically in South Africa and its surrounding countries.
- 8
- 9 Fully aware of the situation, we suggest improving the current circumstances by hiring
- 10 a certified team to research the most efficient way to go about solving South Africa's
- 11 water distribution crisis.
- 12
- 13 Concerned, we discovered over a third of South Africa's water supply is being lost due
- 14 to aged and leaking infrastructure before it can be used, which is why we need to act as
- 15 quickly as possible.

- 17 The delegation of South Africa hereby:
- 18
- 19 Requests upon the U.N. to grant the country of South Africa a loan of 187,500 dollars in
- 20 order to hire an elite team of 5 engineers to research and design new water distribution
- 21 infrastructures such as underground pipes that are less likely to burst, leak, and rust.

- 23 Notes that each engineer will work for a total of 5 months with a salary of 37,500
- 24 dollars total, paying each man or woman 7,500 dollars per month.

- 27 the pipes will be manufactured in South Africa. This would be most beneficial to the
- 28 South African economy, because there would be new jobs produced, and money would

- 3 Alarmed with Nepal's severe health crisis, Nepal has had a brutal decline in health
- 4 education and health services, as there are 2 physicians per 10,000 people, and with 32
- 5 hospitals for a population of nearly 30 million.
- 6
- 7 Drawing attention to the fact the country is living in harsh poverty, with the poverty
- 8 rate being 25.2%, Nepal struggles to provide resources.
- 9
- 10 Noting that the country is also struggling with their rapid population growth, as well as
- 11 the death rate being 5.6 people per 1000 the country cannot provide these critical
- 12 resources the population needs.
- 13
- 14 Bearing in mind the recent earthquake killed a fraction of their population, 9000 people,
- 15 and harshly injured 22,000, it is extremely difficult to provide these administrations of
- 16 wellbeing to the suffering country.
- 17
- 18 Taking into consideration the United Nation's Children's Fund warned the country has
- 19 three million infants, which is over a 10th of their population at risk for death and
- 20 disease because of shortages of fuel, food, medicines and vaccines.
- 21
- 22 Emphasizing the country's existence medical education only serves 6% of their nation,
- 23 they are unable to provide the basic measures for shielding risky medical dilemmas.
- 24
- 25 The Delegation of Nepal Hereby Declares;
- 26
- 27 We urge the United Nations to send approximately 3-4 head physicians to Nepal, these
- 28 physicians will bring a team of 3-4 specialists, and they will serve in the 3 largest cities,
- 29 Patan, Pokhara, and Kathmandu.
- 30
- 31 Recognizing the physicians will operate in convenient locations, that are accessible to
- 32 the vast population.
- 33
- 34 Observing the fact this does not seem substantial for a long period of time, we request
- 35 approximately 30 million dollars for the country to use to train scholars in the medical
- 36 field, this will ensure the country is getting the administrations and education they
- 37 deserve.

38 Fully aware these physicians need a salary, we plan to set aside 2-4 million dollars for
39 salaries.

41 Seeking that in years to come, Nepal will be able to be self sufficient, and dramatically

A Resolution to Stop Terrorism and Poverty

1 Fully aware of the fact that thousands of people die annually in Afghanistan because of
2 terrorism,
3
4 Cognizant that Afghanistan has been at war for seventeen years due to terrorism,
5
6 Noting further that decades of war has destroyed our country and made it one of the
7 poorest countries in the world with seventy percent of the population living in poverty,
8
9 Having considered that over 800,000 people have been left disabled in Afghanistan
10 because of the war, and the vast majority of them are unemployed,
11
12 Taking note that the war costs taxpayers forty-five billion dollars every year, and will
13 also cost future generations,
14
15 Noting with concern that 900 children under the age of five die every day due to the
16 diarrhea and pollution caused by the war,
17
18 Fully alarmed that 31,000 civilians were killed from 2001 to August 2016 because of the
19 war that terrorism started,
20
21 Recognizing that about sixty percent of the population of Afghanistan is illiterate, and
22 about four million Afghans cannot educate themselves due to poverty,
23
24 Acknowledging that Antonio Guterres, Secretary General of the United Nations,
25 announced, "Our most serious shortcoming - and here I refer to the entire international
26 community - is our inability to prevent crises. The United Nations was born from war.
27 Today we must be here for peace."
28
29 The General Assembly Hereby:
30
31 Strongly condemns all acts, methods and practices of terrorism that have caused
32 colossal loss of human life, destruction, and damage worldwide, including heinous
33 attacks that have occurred against United Nations offices in various parts of the world;
34
35 Requests the involvement of the entire international community to mobilize resources
36 and expertise to eliminate international terrorism and threats to international peace and
37 security caused by terrorist acts;

38 Calls upon all Member States to identify and penalize (sue and/or arrest) organizations
39 that are involved in financing and providing training for terrorist activities;
40
41 Encourages the initiative to establish dialogue among communities for the enhancement
42 of interfaith and intercultural understanding to eradicate terrorism;

44 Reminds the need to ensure that any measure taken to counter terrorism complies with

- 22 Encourages that the UN declare all 3 year olds get the vaccination for free in all
- 23 hospitals in Egypt.
- 24
- 25 Reminds the committee that children under the age of 5 are most likely to get malaria.
- 26
- 27 Recognizes that if this vaccination can be distributed over the years, this could save
- 28 many lives of the people of Egypt.
- 29
- 30 Recognizes that this will help eradicate the disease by helping the younger generation
- 31 become immune and make the death toll of malaria go down.

- 33 Trusts that the United Nations will see the urgency in this problem and take action.

A Resolution To Prison Reformations

- 1 To the General Assembly,
- 2
- 3 Noting with concern Chile's prisons are facing the dilemma of overcrowding, while
- 4 punitive policies as well as a shortage of reform services, continue to contribute to the
- 5 rapid growth of prison population in Chile. Data indicates that 50% of the released
- 6 Chilean prisoners relapse into criminal behavior resulting in their return to prison;
- 7
- 8 Recognizing some of the impacts caused by overcrowding in prisons;
- 9
- 10 Keeping in mind an increased overcrowding causes substandard sanitary
- 11 conditions. Prisoners are likely to have existing health problems on entry to prison, as
- 12 they are predominantly from poor educated and economically deprived sectors of the
- 13 general population, with minimal access to adequate health services. Their health
- 14 conditions further deteriorate in jail which are overcrowded, that have poor nutrition,
- 15 inadequate sanitation and access to exercise and fresh air. In addition to this, inmates
- 16 are being starved up to 17 hours per day, and they face insalubrious bathroom
- 17 conditions;
- 18
- 19 Disturbed by the fact that on February 1st, 2017, prison guards violently beat up
- 20 inmates. It is reported that about 46 prisoners were abused by guards. One report in
- 21 specific stated that a finger had been chopped off one of the inmates. This is just one
- 22 example of the cruel treatment in Chile's prisons. Overcrowding in prisons also
- 23 increases the stress levels of the understaffed wardens and guards;
- 24
- 25 Reminding that in Chile, the prison staff have received no specific training regarding
- 26 prison management. Acknowledging the fact that in isolated instances prisoners have
- 27 died due to lack of clear prison procedures and insufficient medical resources in the
- 28 prisons;
- 29
- 30 Bearing in mind that the pocketbook of International Human Rights Standards for
- 31 Prison Officials requires that basic hygiene rights are made available to the prisoners;
- 32
- 33 The General Assembly hereby:
- 34
- 35 Calls upon one of the principle objectives of the United Nations in the area of prison
- 36 reforms is to contribute to the successful reintegration of prisoners into society
- 37 following their release, thereby lowering the rate of return prisoners and avoiding

38 overcrowding in prisons. A significant population of prisoners have drug and alcoholic
39 problems. Such offenders should be strongly encouraged to participate in treatment
40 programs with their sentence length dependent upon their willingness to cooperate with
41 treatments;

42 Further requests that the United Nations can provide much assistance in reforming
43 national legislation, developing training programs for prison managers to improve their
44 leadership role and staff to apply international standards and norms in their daily
45 practice, and by contributing to the institutional capacity building of prison
46 administration;

47
48 Requests the United Nations to help provide us with 508 million US dollar to help the
49 substandard sanitary conditions, improve the training of prison wardens and guards,
50 and to provide resources to help aid with treatment and programs for the inmates to
51 have the necessary skills to survive once they get released;

52
53 Trusts that Chile can implement the integrated strategy on prison reforms through
54 collaboration and partnership with other UN agencies and other international and
55 national organisations engaged in complementary programs for the inmates;

56
57 Emphasizing that this solution will help lower the costs for the prisons and would solve
58 the problem of overcrowding jails, and create a better environment for the inmates to
59 be ready for reintegration into society.

A Resolution to Stop Human Rights Abuses in Indonesia

1 Indonesia is concerned about human rights violations
 2
 3 Shocked and distressed to find rights mistreatments including horrific persecutions of
 4 religious minorities, wounding mistreatment of women, and shocking violations of
 5 LGBT+ people's rights and privacy. People are being thrown in jail, forced to move, or
 6 beaten publicly for their beliefs.
 7
 8 Concerned that women's abuses are so poorly documented that people don't bother
 9 going to report it to the authorities
 10
 11 About 154 women have been murdered this year
 12
 13 In 2015, 316,742 reports of domestic violence of women and over time it has only
 14 gotten worse
 15
 16 In 1993, a UN Commission on Human Rights resolution expressed grim concerns over
 17 affirmations of vital human rights violations by the Indonesian government.
 18
 19 They passed a law that allowed the Human Rights commission to investigate Human
 20 Rights allegations
 21
 22 The president has been attempting to help improve human rights for religious
 23 minorities and the LGBT+ community.
 24
 25 A recommendation for action to improve human rights is the government needs to
 26 follow the president.
 27
 28 The government and presidents are clashing because they don't agree on Human
 29 Rights.
 30
 31 The UN can also help the culture tolerate the LGBT+ communities and religious
 32 minorities
 33
 34 The culture that is clashing is Islam
 35
 36 Not all of Indonesia follows Islamic law
 37

38 The place where it's the worse is Aceh

39 However, the provinces that do often persecute people.

40
 41 We are requesting they crush anti-LGBT+ propaganda and publish positive ads
 42 endorsed by popular celebrities already supporting the cause

43
 44 In conclusion, the problem is that the government, culture, and president are clashing
 45 because of tolerance issues such as accepting LGBT+ people
 46

A Resolution to Improve Unsafe Drinking Water in China

- 1 Deeply concerned that China has major water issues.
- 2
- 3 Considering that less than 6% of China's land mass provides more than two-thirds
- 4 (69%) of the country's water supply.
- 5
- 6 Noting that 73% of the watersheds that supply water to china have medium to high
- 7 levels of pollution.
- 8
- 9 Noting further savings in water treatment could offset a significant portion of the
- 10 catchment conservation costs. These costs are up to 8 billion dollars a year.
- 11
- 12 Bearing in mind the Nature Conservancy agency has been studying the state of water
- 13 around the world. They dove deeper into China's water resources given the country's
- 14 challenges and the importance to the global economy, environment and human
- 15 development.
- 16
- 17 Recognizing there is great potential to improve water quality for major cities by
- 18 investing in natural solutions in small and medium sized catchments (those are less
- 19 than 100,000 square kilometers in size).
- 20
- 21 The Delegation of China hereby:
- 22
- 23 Seeks to be able to reduce nutrient and sediment pollution which in turn will create
- 24 better quality water.
- 25
- 26 Requests 300 million dollars a year for the next ten years.
- 27
- 28 Reaffirms that money being invested in natural solutions will be beneficial to the water
- 29 quality and to nature itself.
- 30
- 31 Calls upon the United Nations to greatly improve water quality for over 150 million
- 32 people.

An Act to Prohibit Child Labor in Sierra Leone in Exchange for Machinery and Aid Workers

- 1 Alarmed that 81% of the population of Sierra Leone is below the poverty line.
- 2
- 3 Mindful that a civil war 27 years ago has impacted daily life in the country negatively.
- 4
- 5 Taking into consideration that 72% of Sierra Leone's children are engaging in forced
- 6 child labor.
- 7
- 8 Recognizing minor advancements have been taken to end child labor, but none have
- 9 proven effective. Laws are not in place, and the issue has been overlooked by civilians
- 10 and the authorities.
- 11
- 12 Aware that the major industries involving child labor are diamond mining, granite
- 13 mining, oil extracting, coffee bean harvesting, and cocoa harvesting. Diamond mining is
- 14 most often forced onto children.
- 15
- 16 The delegation of Sierra Leone hereby:
- 17
- 18 Proclaims that Sierra Leone develops and enforces a law that prohibits the engagement
- 19 of child labor. In exchange for these laws, the United Nations will provide machinery for
- 20 the diamond mining sites in Sierra Leone.
- 21
- 22 Assures that a trial run will be conducted at 9.5 diamond mining sites, of 19, that have
- 23 been engaging in child labor. 6.3 million dollars in machinery will be given to each site,
- 24 in exchange for the outlaw of child labor. Instead, there will be an adult working force.
- 25
- 26 Requests the United Nations for 60 million dollars in total, which will be given in a time
- 27 frame of 5 years. UNICEF (United Nations Children's Fund) workers will work in the
- 28 mines temporarily for 7 years until the adults of Sierra Leone are able to take on this
- 29 role. This will go into effect as soon as possible.

A resolution to end the Syrian refugee crisis in Europe.

To the General Assembly:

Deeply concerned by the refugee crisis in Europe due to the civil war in Syria and the economic conditions and instabilities of many North African countries and Middle Eastern nations;

Acknowledging that as of June this year, approximately 76,000 refugees have arrived by sea to Europe from countries such as Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan, Tunisia, Eritrea, Sudan, and others and well over a million refugees since the Syrian war began;

Noting with grave concern the dangers migrants face such as: drowning, being smuggled, being a victim of violence, crime in general, and deplorable living conditions;

Noting that the UN High Commissioner said in a statement it was 'shocked' by deaths and called for urgent action to protect refugee drownings at sea which have exceeded 1,000 just this year;

Also noting the amount of refugees flowing into Europe, and the Republic of Poland's limited ability to support them;

Deeply concerned that current access to protection and support from local, national, and global agencies and organizations is entirely insufficient;

Fully alarmed by the dangers that potential terrorists disguised as refugees/asylum seekers pose to Poland and other European nations' security, preservation of culture, and overall regional stability;

Noting with concern the increased terrorist plots, attacks and terror cells started that have been carried out to disrupt European stability;

We would like to remind the members of the UN that this is not just a crisis for Poland, but also for the rest of the world as acts of terrorism has occurred in greater numbers around the globe;

Having considered the use of Mustard gas and other such chemical weapons by the Syrian Arab Republic, possibility of devastating loss of civilian life;

The delegation of Poland hereby:

Calls upon the UN to make available to the UN Security Council necessary armed forces to address the refugee crisis at the European border;

Further requests an increase in naval presence in the Mediterranean Sea, blockading North African ports to halt the dangerous and prevalent practice of human trafficking which has lead to 1,000 deaths at sea this year alone;

We recommend that all entry points to Europe be more fully secured and that a timely and efficient process be implemented to determine refugee status;

Calls upon the UN Security Council to find a resolution to end the Syrian civil war and provide immediate rapid reaction force and funds which can be used to stabilize the region and halt the mass exodus of refugees to Europe;

Urges all members to sufficiently aid refugee camps through the use of funds from UNICEF (United Nations Children's Fund), WHO (World Health Organization), and WFP (World Food Program), and improve economic conditions by sufficiently funding UNCDF (United Nations Capital Development Fund), and UNFPA (United Nations Funds for Population Activities);

Fully believing that the UN can successfully work toward a stabilized and restored region for civilian purposes and prosperity.

- 26 Affirms, this cannot solve all of the world's pollution problems, nevertheless, it can help
- 27 significantly with pollution in larger cities;
- 28
- 29 Further recommends we implant these in big city buildings and businesses that are the
- 30 main generators of air pollution;

- 32 Having considered, the environmentalist in our country stating possible solutions we
- 33 might need to begin considering their thoughts, as they've been stating that ocean
- 34 pollution is still very reversible but we need to take action soon before it becomes
- 35 irreversible;

- 35 are to our great country.

25 early 2020.

27 Notes that this will not only help reduce drug dealing, but also poverty, health, and
28 other countries around Guinea Bissau

- 20 could also be used in other countries to prevent further terrorist attacks;
- 21
- 22 Further reminds the United Nations that over 230 people have died from terrorist
- 23 attacks in France in the past three years;
- 24
- 25 Further invites better security into France to prevent terrorist attacks at any given time;
- 26
- 27 Seeks help from French allies and the United Nations against terrorist attacks and
- 28 bombings.

A Resolution to help the water crisis in Jordan

- 1 Noting with concern, 1.4 million refugees enter Jordan each year, which increases the
- 2 average population to 10 million people.
- 3
- 4 Being mindful of Jordan's natural resources, including water, crops, and oil, are seized
- 5 by its neighboring countries, such as, Israel, Syria, Iraq, Saudi Arabia, and Palestine.
- 6
- 7 The only major water sources are the Jordan River and the Yarmouk River which are
- 8 also used by Israel and Syria, who leave little water for the ever-growing country.
- 9
- 10 Fully alarmed that the 90% of their water from their resources is either taken or
- 11 evaporated, which leaves them 10% left.
- 12
- 13 Jordan has hit historically low levels of water and record high temperatures, which
- 14 means more water will evaporate, leaving them with hardly enough water to sustain 10
- 15 million people.
- 16
- 17 Having considered the UN has already provided assistance and protection to 2 million
- 18 refugees of the population, that still leaves 8 million people including citizens of Jordan
- 19 and refugees.
- 20
- 21 Deeply concerning that the amount of water leaked through pipes could help 2.6 million
- 22 people, which is almost 1/4 of Jordan's population.
- 23
- 24 Recognizing that the U.S government has had a 60 year partnership with Jordan and
- 25 has invested more time and money than any other country;
- 26 USAIDS has totalled more than 700 Million Dollars since the 2000s.
- 27
- 28 Observing that unsustainable groundwater extraction leads to water shortages, people
- 29 start to fight over what little water there is.
- 30
- 31 Recognizing that there were 177 Community Based Organizations that improved water
- 32 demand to help people in the community.
- 33
- 34 Acknowledging that the increasing population reduced the average amount of
- 35 freshwater to less than 150m3 per year.
- 36
- 37 Recalling that 50% of their water supply is taken and/or lost due to evaporation, 3% of
- 38 the water contributes to Jordan's GDP.

A Resolution to End the Civil War in South Sudan

1 Conscious of the need to end the current Civil War right now between President Kiir's
2 troops and his deputy, Riek Machar's supporters that loyally fight for him, and the
3 urgency to create a way to unify them,

4
5 Keeping in mind that there are still 12.23 million people living in South Sudan that have
6 a very high chance of dying from the raging Civil War by troops and airstrikes, we need
7 to seek protection for these South Sudanese people and the country of South Sudan,

8 Noting with concern that the Model UN knows horrendous Civil War, they have taken
9 some steps toward eradicating the Civil War and protecting the people there so they
10 can have harmonious lives, like establishing peace treaties that did not work so well

11
12 Reiterating, the country is devastated of many losses, such as people, economy, and
13 trade from the Civil War,

14
15 The delegation of South Sudan does hereby:

16
17 Urge one peacekeeper from each country to go to South Sudan for one year, each
18 country should pay for their peacekeeper, the cost for one peacekeeper for a year in
19 South Sudan would be 17,136 U.S. dollars so for 194 peacekeepers, the price for the
20 total cost is 3,324,384 U.S. dollars,

21
22 Endorsing that the peacekeepers shall go to the main parties and to talk to them about
23 to not shoot anymore, the peacekeepers finish talking to the main parties to stop
24 shooting which is the president and the rebels that fight for the vice president,

25
26 Emphasizing the fact that each peacekeeper from each country will give them 1 million
27 dollars of what currency they use plus food and water in exchange for the permission of
28 firearms,

29
30 Calling upon the peacekeepers that stay in South Sudan should build an arsenal for
31 weapons so only the military has access to them which would cost ten million U.S.
32 dollars,

33
34 Seeking ten soldiers per each country to help guard the arsenal and make sure no one
35 trespasses into the arsenal, 10 soldiers for each country will be 120,000 U.S. dollars,
36 each country will pay for their soldiers,

38 Confident that each country will send 10 soldiers for one year and the countries that
39 send soldier to the South Sudanese arsenal will not have to send soldiers to the arsenal
40 ever again unless they want to volunteer for another year with a different country,

41
42 Bearing in mind that until the civil war has ended, it is absolutely necessary on the part
43 of the United Nations to force the measures that assure the the civil war is neutralized
44 and threat of the war is no more,

45
46 Entreat the United Nations to take responsibility in providing food through the World
47 Food Program, and for medical clinics, while furthermore providing for hygiene clinics to

A Resolution to Decrease Terrorism and Corruption in the Republic of Tajikistan

To the General Assembly:

We, the delegates, are deeply concerned by the fact that Tajikistan has been experiencing an increase in terrorism since 2015.

Acknowledging that Tajikistan is experiencing terrorism from one of the most dangerous terrorist groups to exist.

Islamic State has been terrorizing Tajikistan for over 3 years. Since 2015 Islamic State has been a big threat to citizens in Tajikistan and other parts of the world.

Realizing that terrorists imprisoned about 200 opposition activists. The terrorists expelled and kidnapped government critics abroad. They arrested several lawyers and at least one journalist, and also harassed workers at nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) with difficult and demanding checks.

Noting with concern that Umarali Kuvatov, an opposition leader of Group 24, was shot and killed by assailants while he was in Istanbul, Turkey. Group 24 was a citizen lead group, which they elected leaders to lead the group of oppositionists. The members of Group 24 and Umarali Kuvatov opposed President Emomali Rahmon and the government of Tajikistan. President Rahmon banned Group 24 in October of 2015.

Observing that Tajikistan denied Afghanistan air raids. Afghanistan is trying to bomb Russia and Tajikistan.

There are guards around the Tajikistan border because of Afghanistan threats and the increasing amount of drug trafficking through Tajikistan to the other parts of Asia. Border clashes between Afghanistan and Tajikistan occur.

Having examined that since the start of terrorism there has been an increasing amount in drug trafficking. Drugs from Afghanistan are being smuggled out into Asia through Tajikistan.

Noting with satisfaction that the capital of Tajikistan, Dushanbe started an anti-corruption agency for the country. The anti-corruption agency began with only 14

individuals. The agency members elected key anti-corruption leaders, political and investigator resources and opposition figures in the agency.

Viewing with appreciation that many people are asking if the anti-corruption agency is using fraud and bribery to put people in jail. The Supreme Court of Tajikistan is standing by the anti-corruption force and saying that all of the evidence used to bring people to justice is real and reliable data and information.

We the delegates of Tajikistan strongly recommend that the United Nations support Tajikistan's government and military forces to help reduce the terrorism and corruption in Tajikistan.

Request that the United Nations send 100 extra troops to Tajikistan to protect the border of Tajikistan from terrorism flowing into the country.

Recommending further that the United Nations help end impunity, reform public administration, and finance management, promote transparency and access to information, empower citizens, and close international loopholes by donating money to the anti-corruption agency in Tajikistan.

Considering many different ways to get the money for this donation, the best would be to ask allies and neighboring countries to donate money to the United Nations to help Tajikistan's citizens and government reduce the corruption for the cities in Tajikistan suffering from the corruption effects.

In conclusion, Tajikistan's corruption and terrorism can be resolved with the United Nations support Tajikistan's government and military forces, raising money and enforcing new government officials.

10 Promoting evidence for investing in girls' education with confidence, and emphasising the dramatic impact it will have on the world as we know it if we act now and secure the education for girls everywhere, starting with the south African region,

- 23 We ask for 1,000,000 USD to fulfill this solution to Mali's lack of clean water.

22 Fully alarmed that single parent families are 3 times more likely to be in poverty than
23 two parent families,
24
25 The Delegation of Poverty Campaign for Ireland does Hereby:
26
27 We humbly ask the non-government organisation, Operation Tiny-Homes along with
28 Focus Ireland to supply workers for the creation of 100 tiny homes in Dublin,
29
30 Notes that the total cost will be 3,552,500 U.S. dollars, which will be paid by the UN
31 and the Irish Government,
32
33 Affirms that the tiny homes will be equipped with a bed, shelves, safe, windows, and a
34 fan that runs on battery power along with the tiny houses being government-run and
35 the houses will be put in Dublin,
36

37 Aware that 50% of the tiny houses will be given to the homeless and the rest of the
 38 50% going to people in poverty,
 39
 40 If the tiny houses are beneficial then we will increase the scale of the houses across
 41 Ireland,

- 7 education level, or marital status towards women;

- 9 Recognizing that the legal system is based entirely off the Islamic religion and that
- 10 there is no separation between religion and state, and that the Shariah law is
- 11 particularly strict toward women;
- 12
- 13 Noting further that male guardianship laws require a father, husband, brother, or son to
- 14 consent to many actions of the women or girl fully restricts their freedoms expressed in
- 15 the Declaration of Human Rights;
- 16
- 17 Deeply concerned that the legal system makes it nearly impossible for victims of
- 18 domestic violence to obtain legal redress because the police often insist that women
- 19 and girls obtain their guardian's authorisation to file a complaint;
- 20
- 21 Having examined that the current rules and customs have significantly impacted the
- 22 lives of Saudi women and its economy with the country ranking 138 out of 144 on the
- 23 2017 Global Gender Gap Report.
- 24
- 25 Regretting that women also face discrimination in the courts, where the testimony of
- 26 one man equals that of two women;
- 27
- 28 Recognizing the recent efforts the Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman is making to
- 29 restore moderate, open Islam beginning with the lifting of the driving ban and on
- 30 women and lifting the sports attendance ban this spring, not requiring permission from
- 31 a male guardian to attend university, take a job, or undergo surgery;
- 32
- 33 The delegation of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia hereby;
- 34
- 35 Recommends that women be provided with access to the court system without
- 36 permission from a male family member under the current guardianship system ;
- 37

38 Suggests placing limits on the amount of male judges allowed in the judiciary proper to
39 create an equal balance of male and female judges and encourage more women to
40 become a judge;

41
42 Considers allowing time between declaration of divorce by male guardian and entry to
43 court to avoid lack of consideration of court case by judge;

44
45 Seeks that the UN especially enforce Article 1 of the Universal Declaration of Human
46 Rights "All human beings are free and equal in dignity and rights" and Article 2 that
47 states there "can be no distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language,
48 religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other
49 status";

50
51 Calls on the government of Saudi Arabia to abolish the Male Guardianship system which
52 is discriminatory toward a woman's freedom;

54 Supports the achievement of Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 that declares women to be a
55 "great asset" whose talents will be developed for the good of the country's society and
56 economy by focusing on equality of freedoms and rights.

- 22 Alarmed by the fact that the average pay of any one person in Jamaica is 149,105
- 23 Jamaican Dollars and 1,241 in USD; while the average police officer make only 5,000
- 24 USD a year.
- 25
- 26 We the delegation of Jamaica do hereby:
- 27
- 28 Call upon the United Nations to offer support to the police force of Jamaica, hoping to
- 29 protect the good citizens and tourists in their country, leading to a safer, more
- 30 welcoming place to live and travel;
- 31
- 32 Provide the police with the proper training and make the police qualified to protect the
- 33 citizens from harm and lower the rate of crime.
- 34
- 35 Give the police officers solar powered bikes, instead of giving them pedal bicycles;
- 36 Ask 8 million USD for one cop car, giving the cops a better means of transportation;

38 Offer support to raise the wage of police to 13,000 Jamaican Dollars giving the

A Resolution to Protect the Civilians in Idlib, Syria

To the General Assembly:

3 Deeply concerned about the civilians trapped in Idlib, Syria that are at risk of death
4 caused by the war between the rebels and the Syrian government aided by Russia;
5
6 Recognizing that the Security Council had unanimously voted on a previous resolution
7 for a Cease-Fire in Syria on February 24, 2018 to allow time for humanitarian aid to be
8 delivered for the civilians trapped in a bombardment in Damascus;
9
10 Recalling that Sweden's ambassador the UN stated that the Cease-Fire would "de-
11 escalate suffering and save lives";
12
13 Fully alarmed by the extent of civilian human suffering and the staggering number of
14 casualties so far which have reached approximately 400,000;
15
16 Bearing in mind that there are diseases such as measles, hepatitis A, leishmaniasis,
17 poliomyelitis, meningitis, and scabies that are afflicting and killing Syrian civilians
18 because of the deplorable conditions and because they cannot receive medical care;
19
20 Recognizing that there is an agreement in place demilitarizing Idlib, between Russia,
21 Turkey, and Syria;
22
23 Fully aware that the demilitarizing agreement may not maintain peace in Idlib due to
24 escalating tensions, mere relocation of heavy weapons, and the number of parties that
25 need to agree and comply with the deal, and that more citizens could potentially be
26 killed;
27
28 Affirming what Cynthia Lee, a Damascus-based official with the International
29 Committee of the Red Cross, said "Any solution that removes the immediate threat of
30 military action is welcome. We now have to wait and see how the announced
31 'demilitarized zone around Idlib will be implemented."
32
33 Acknowledging that the Declaration of Human Rights recognizes the Right to Life,
34 Liberty, and Security of Person; Right To Asylum; and the Right to Freedom from
35 Torture and Degrading Conditions;
36

37 Recognizing the incredible burden that has been placed on the surrounding nations
 38 which have absorbed the greatest number of refugees from the Syrian Civil War;
 39
 40 Reaffirming that under International Humanitarian Law civilians must be treated
 41 humanely in all circumstances and against all forms of violence and degrading
 42 treatment;
 43
 44 The delegation of Syria hereby:
 45
 46 Requests the United Nations security forces immediately respond and provide military
 47 assistance to civilian trapped in Idlib in this matter;
 48
 49 Calls upon the UN to create a corridor to secure the safety of the civilians fleeing the
 50 stronghold of Idlib;
 51
 52 Encourages the creation of a refugee camp specifically for the relocation of citizens at
 53 risk in Idlib;
 54
 55 Urges the United Nations to provide the proper medicine, food, shelter, and aid that the
 56 refugees require for organizations such as CARE USA, Airlink, Islamic Relief, Save the
 57 Children and many more;
 58
 59 Authorized by the Charter of the United Nations: "Directing an attack against personnel
 60 and objects involved in a peacekeeping mission in accordance with the Charter of the
 61 United Nations, as long as they are entitled to the protection given to civilians and
 62 civilian objects under international humanitarian law, is prohibited";
 63
 64 Taking note of Rule 1. The Principle of Distinction between Civilians and Combat; The
 65 parties to the conflict must at all times distinguish between civilians and combatants.
 66 Attacks must not be directed against civilians.

- 5 their population was 1.95 million. According to UN statistics, this is a more precipitous
- 6 drop in population than there has ever been in other countries.
- 7
- 8 Observing, that the Baltic Sea is almost totally surrounded by land, which makes it
- 9 more endangered by pollution than other marine areas. The Baltic Sea is, sadly,
- 10 actually one of the most polluted seas in the world.
- 11
- 12 Acknowledging, that only 68.7% of Latvians are employed, which means that about
- 13 31.3% of Latvians are unemployed. There is a need to make water potable and open up
- 14 more jobs so that less people will leave Latvia.
- 15
- 16 We the delegation of Latvia hereby:
- 17
- 18 Proposes the idea of building a water treatment factory to decrease pollution and clean
- 19 the water. After doing that, we believe that fewer people will leave Latvia due to lack of
- 20 clean water and jobs, as a factory will also create more jobs along with cleaning the
- 21 water to make it potable.
- 22
- 23 Draws attention to the fact that, people are leaving Latvia to find jobs in other places.
- 24 Not only will a factory give people jobs; it will also decrease water pollution. We feel
- 25 citizens are leaving the country due to lack of clean drinking water and employment
- 26 opportunities. Our resolution addresses both of these issues.
- 27
- 28 Requests that the United Nations address this issue because building this will help
- 29 decrease pollution in the Baltic Sea so that surrounding countries will have a cleaner
- 30 water supply.
- 31
- 32 Acknowledges that, to build a water treatment factory in Latvia would cost about
- 33 \$500,000 to \$1,500,000. The United Nations budget is \$5.4 billion, so the United
- 34 Nations would still have about \$5:3985 billion to \$5:3995 billion left in their budget.
- 35
- 36 Seeks action as soon as possible in order for the people of Latvia to have better water
- 37 and more jobs so that fewer people would leave Latvia.

A resolution to educate a specific populous in Cote d'Ivoire about how to treat and prevent malaria:

- 1 Noting with concern the rising numbers of deaths each year due to malaria, primarily
- 2 those under five years old at a striking number of 63,000 children,
- 3
- 4 Emphasizing that the UN attributed more impregnated bed nets, better diagnostics, and
- 5 more effective drugs to decrease the spread in malaria,
- 6
- 7 Acknowledging that UNICEF has and will continue to assist the Ministry of Health in
- 8 providing a package of cost effective interventions for child survival,
- 9
- 10 Having examined that though these supplies have been provided since 2008, the
- 11 knowledge on how to use the bed nets and follow through with prevention treatment
- 12 has been scarce,
- 13
- 14 Deeply concerned if the population is not well, agricultural work that sustains the
- 15 economy of Cote d'Ivoire will lessen,
- 16
- 17 Fully aware that when income is not brought in, medical costs can not be covered, and
- 18 organization such as UNICEF can only reach certain areas with limited supplies to aid
- 19 those with a lack of money,
- 20
- 21 Recognizing that other countries such as Equatorial Guinea, The Congo, and Ethiopia
- 22 suffer from malaria and are also supplied with bed nets but, most of the time no further
- 23 lessons on how to slow the spread of malaria among the younger generations that will
- 24 one day sustain the countries' economies,
- 25
- 26 The General Assembly hereby:
- 27
- 28 Calls upon medical professionals sent from countries that specialize in disease
- 29 prevention, to spend a short period of time in academic and occupational facilities
- 30 educating young children and some adults on how to use the supplies they have been
- 31 granted over the years to prevent malaria,
- 32
- 33 Expresses its hope that in doing this, UNICEF can continue to provide supplies and
- 34 vaccinations to much of the population of Cote D'Ivoire, especially to those that sustain
- 35 the economy with agricultural work;
- 36

37 Encourages targeting specific industries in Cote D'Ivoire that could house and contribute
38 to informational meetings on malaria prevention and treatment with minor funding from
39 the United Nations;

40
41 Recommends that the medical professionals spend two to three days in a malaria heavy
42 areas, teaching first about supplies and then giving vaccinations. This way even though
43 treatment is not effective for many with malaria, prevention will begin to cut back the
44 number of young children and adults that are more prone to malaria.

6
7 Taking into consideration that the freshwater resources of Kyrgyzstan have been
8 heavily polluted mostly by uranium and land degradation

9
10 Recalling to the Declaration of Human Rights, which recognizes sufficient, affordable,
11 and safe water to all people alike

12
13 Alarmed by the fact that more than 725 villages do not have safe and affordable
14 drinking water

15
16 Keeping in mind that there were 1,296 deaths in Kyrgyzstan that were related to
17 polluted waters, which contained high amounts of uranium from the abandoned Soviet
18 Union mining areas

19
20 Fully aware that the UN and Human Right Watch have started funding the construction
21 of water filtration in Kyrgyzstan and also the UN has invested in better soil for farmers
22 to help with land degradation, erosion, and also to reduce the amount of pesticides
23 needed to grow crops

24
25 Acknowledging that the Kyrgyz Republic has already taken action in the water problem
26 and started a project called Ala-Toobulagy, which allocated 51 million dollars to water
27 purification and water resources in the areas of Osh, Chui, Issyk-Kul, and Jalal-Abad

28
29 Taking note that UN Secretary-general Ban Ki-Moon said, "The 2030 Agenda for
30 Sustainable Development promises to leave no one behind in access to basic services,
31 including water and sanitation. Realizing this vision requires a comprehensive approach
32 based on human rights principles"

33
34 The delegation of Kyrgyzstan hereby:

36 Welcomes all members of the United Nations, especially those in Central Asia, to
37 support and employ water filtration plants in hydroelectric dams, particularly in the
38 vicinity of water environment that hosts a large population of people.

39
40 To allocate money to add water filtration plants in hydroelectric dams in polluted water
41 bodies in order to reduce the amount of water related deaths for the natives of Central
42 Asia and visitors of said countries.

43
44 The delegation of Kyrgyzstan further invites other nations in Central Asia to join
45 Kyrgyzstan in providing central water systems to the rural towns and villages for better
46 easier access .

47
48 The delegation of Kyrgyzstan recommends that the United Nations appropriately funds
49 the treatment and maintenance of water that is very important to the lives of millions
50 of people.

51
52 The delegation of Kyrgyzstan also calls upon China, Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan and
53 Tajikistan to help fund monitor and clean the high amounts of water pollution that
54 affects the natives and the countries that the rivers flow through.

55
56 The delegation of Kyrgyzstan further requests the proper treatment of abandoned
57 Soviet Union uranium mines, which pollute the river's around them.

58
59 The delegation of Kyrgyzstan requests the United Nations to fund 100,000 USD for 3
60 major hydroelectric dams for 3 years

62 The delegation of Kyrgyzstan endorses further discussion of the necessity of water
63 sanitation and water accessibility in Kyrgyzstan and the countries surrounding it by the

- 16 Recommends that new hospitals be constructed throughout Chad while old ones are
- 17 revised;
- 18 Encourages the Chadian government to spend more money on improving health
- 19 services in exchange for the financial aid;
- 20 Seeks numerous humanitarian workers until Chad has resolved it's need for improved
- 21 health care, workers, and facilities.
